SPECIAL CANDLELIGHTING SERVICE TO BE HELD ON CHRISTMAS EVE

The rich and varied beauty of Christmas will be expressed through Christmas music to be presented by the three church choirs and guest soloist at a Candlelight Carol Service on December 18 at 7:30.

By virtue of two handsome candelabra built especially for this service by Wilson Young, the church will be illuminated by the soft glow of candlelight, as the Senior Choir sings French, Bohemian, German, and Latin carols, old and new,

In one of the songs, the Youth Choir will act as an Echo from the balcony.

The Junior Choir will sing Leo Sowerby's "Tho Snow Lay on the Ground," and Dickinson's delightful carol, "The Friendly Benste"

The Rev. Charles Stratton will rend the various portions from Scripture,

Donald Geyer, outstanding baritone from Newark,
will sing five Christmas
solos, including the familiar "Birthday of the King"
by Neidlinger and "Gesu
Bambino" by Yon.

Dear Friends

"The world is filled with people who have eyes and ears, yet who do not see or hear," Helen Keller once said. "I would rather be blind and deaf than one of these."
